Dear Mayor Casetti and Mr. Bshura:

I am writing to you on behalf of the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Brotherhood Awards Black History Program Committee and as a lifelong resident of the Ansonia community with a heartfelt request. As a proud member of this community and an advocate for honoring those who have made significant contributions to our school and its students, I would like to propose naming the middle school gymnasium after Mr. Marvin H. Franks in part as recognition of his many years of service to the students of Ansonia. On February 24, 2024, the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Brotherhood Awards Committee will honor Mr. Franks with this year's award for his service and commitment to Ansonia Public Schools.

Mr. Franks was the first certified African American teacher in the Ansonia Public Schools where he taught for 40 years before his retirement in 2010. During his tenure as a teacher in Ansonia he taught at Willis Grammar School and developed many programs, including the Multi-Cultural Program, Science Cub, Chess Club, and a Homework Club. Mr. Franks was also nominated as Teacher of the Year in Ansonia in 1984, 1985, and 1986. During his lengthy career, he was heavily involved in athletics. In the 1970s as the basketball coach for the freshmen and JV teams at O'Brien Technical High School. He organized the girls' and boys' intramural basketball teams, the freshman boys' basketball team which was undefeated under his leadership in the 1980s. In addition, Mr. Franks was the varsity softball coach for Ansonia High from 1984-2000. His teams made 11 state tournament appearances including the finals when they lost by a score of 1-0. His history as a pre-eminent softball coach is noted through winning the Naugatuck Valley League Championship in 1993, a silver medal in 1996, and a gold medal in 1997 during the Nutmeg State Games.

Mr. Marvin Franks dedicated forty years of his life to Ansonia Public Schools as a teacher as both a beloved basketball coach and an inspirational teacher. His impact on our school community extends far beyond the basketball court or the classroom. He was not only committed to fostering athletic excellence but also to instill values of teamwork, discipline, and perseverance in all of his students.

During his tenure, Mr. Franks led his teams in basketball and softball to numerous victories, instilling a sense of pride and sportsmanship in Ansonia public schools and the community as a whole. Moreover, he touched the lives of countless students through his dedication to teaching and mentorship, shaping them into responsible and successful individuals.

Naming the middle school gymnasium after Mr. Marvin H. Franks would serve as a lasting tribute to his legacy and the positive impact he had on generations of students in Ansonia and the state of



Connecticut. It would also inspire current and future students to emulate his example of excellence, integrity, and service.

I believe that renaming the middle school gymnasium in Marvin H. Frank's honor would not only be a fitting tribute but also a meaningful way to preserve his memory for years to come. I kindly request that you consider this proposal and initiate the necessary steps to make it a reality.

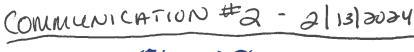

**President Shuart:** 

Settlement Funds Distribution, PLH Vineyard Sky, et al. v. Ansonia

As you know, last year the Board of Aldermen authorized settlement of a federal lawsuit commenced against the City of Ansonia by the developers of a solar farm on 31 Benz Street. The solar development was approved by the State Siting Council – over the City's objection – and therefore does not fall under the jurisdiction of the City's local land use boards. The lawsuit was commenced over the City's refusal to allow the developer to tie into the City's storm water sewer system without adequate assurance that the developer would follow all protocols

established and approved by the siting counsel.

As the result of a mediation in this matter conducted on September 13, 2023, the City and developer agreed upon terms — authorized by the Board of Aldermen and recommended by independent mediator Roy L. De Barbieri — to resolve the claim in a manner that protects Ansonia residents while allowing the solar project to proceed as directed by the State Siting Council.

Specifically, the settlement achieves the following for the City and its residents:

- A \$40,000 settlement to the City, which the Mayor's office hereby recommends be
  distributed to all homeowners directly impacted by the solar development. A list of all
  residents abutting, and/or directly facing without impediment, the solar project on 31
  Benz and the developer's property at 135 Hill Street, has been assembled and attached
  hereto as <u>EXHIBIT A</u>. It is recommended that the one-time settlement proceeds be evenly
  apportioned to this list of homeowners.
- A yearly PILOT payment (payment in lieu of taxes) on otherwise untaxable solar equipment, payable to the City by the developers relative to 31 Benz Street in the amount of \$15,000 per year for the first 10 years, \$9,000 per year for the second ten years, and \$12,000 per year thereafter. Importantly, solar panels are otherwise not taxable under Connecticut law.

- Preservation of a portion of the Hill Street property (approximately one third of the property abutting Sharyl Drive) to be permanently dedicated to the City as open space.
- The installation of a fixed-knot game fence as a perimeter fence for the solar facilities, in addition to the row of arborvitaes trees required by the Siting Council plan, to mitigate the visual impact on abutting properties.
- Payment to the City of a \$180,000 tax credit, upon the operation of the proposed solar facilities.
- An agreement by developer to remediate any/all blighted conditions on the residential property located on the Benz property.

The settlement agreement is attached as **EXHIBIT B**, for your reference.

Please let this letter serve as a formal request, on behalf of the Mayor's Office, that the Board of Aldermen vote to disperse the \$40,000 in settlement funds to the homeowners identified in EXHIBIT A, as recommended above.

## EXHIBIT B

### **SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT**

This Settlement Agreement (the "Agreement") dated as of September 13, 2023 is among (i) PLH Vineyard Sky LLC ("PLH"), (ii) Ecos Energy LLC ("Ecos"), (iii) Allco Finance Limited ("Allco"), (iv) Windham Solar LLC ("Windham"), (v) Vineyard Sky Farms Corp ("VSF" and collectively with Allco, PLH, Ecos and Windham the "Settling Parties") and (iv) the City of Ansonia (the "City"). The Settling Parties and the City are also referred to collectively herein as the "Parties" and individually as a "Party."

WHEREAS, PLH is the owner of 31 Benz Street in the City, which VSF and Allco are lessees (the "Benz Street Property");

WHEREAS, VSF is the owner of 135 Hill Street in the City (the "Hill Street Property and together with the Benz Street Property, the "Properties");

WHEREAS, on June 21, 2021, the State of Connecticut Siting Council ("CSC") approved the petition of Windham for the construction, maintenance, and operation of an aggregate of 1.99 megawatts (MWs) of solar photovoltaic electric generating facilities located at 31 Benz Street in the City (together the "Benz Street Facilities");

WHERAS, VSF desires to develop a 0.99MW solar facility at the Hill Street Property (the "Hill Street Facility" and together with the Benz Street Facilities, the "Solar Facilities")

WHEREAS, the City has notified PLH of a purported blight violation at 31 Benz Street (the "Blight Dispute") and has filed a lien on the property at 31 Benz Street in connection therewith (the "Lien"), both of which PLH disputes;

WHEREAS, on November 5, 2021, VSF filed an application for a zoning permit to clear the trees at 135 Hill Street (the "Clearing Application") and, as of the date hereof, the City has not processed the Clearing Application;

WHEREAS, on December 6, 2021, Ecos filed an application for a building permit to connect 31 Benz Street to the City's stormwater sewer system (the "Stormwater Application" and together with the Clearing Application, the "Applications") and, as of the date hereof, the City has not processed the Stormwater Application;

WHEREAS, the Parties have resolved all outstanding issues between them, including with respect to the development of the Solar Facilities at the Properties, the Blight Dispute, the Lien and the Applications, and as such wish to memorialize their mutual understandings in this Agreement and stipulate as to certain conditions, as further set forth below.

**THEREFORE**, in consideration of the mutual promises and representations below, and intending to be legally bound, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Commencing in the year which the Benz Street Facilities achieve commercial operation, PLH will make annual payments to the City in the following amounts per year in lieu of any real or personal property taxes that may otherwise be due with respect to the Benz Street

Property (including the Solar Facilities and any personal property and equipment located at the Benz Street Property): (i) \$15,000 per year for the first 10 years, (ii) \$9,000 per year for the second ten years and (iii) \$12,000 per year for years 21 and beyond, subject to the As-Built Adjustment. Commencing in the year which the Hill Street Facility achieves commercial operation VSF will make annual payments to the City in the following amounts per year in lieu of any real or personal property taxes that may otherwise be due with respect to the Hill Street Property (including the Solar Facilities and any personal property and equipment located at the Hill Street Property): (i) \$15,000 per year for the first 10 years, (ii) \$9,000 per year for the second ten years and (iii) \$12,000 per year for years 21 and beyond, subject to the As-Built Adjustment. If any of the Solar Facilities are built in part on both the Benz Street Property and the Hill Street Property, the stated amount for such facility will be apportioned to each property based on the MW size of the project located on such property (the "As-Built Adjustment"). For the avoidance of doubt, any additional residential structures built on the 31 Benz Street or Hill Street Properties will not be subject to the foregoing tax arrangement and will be separately taxed by the City.

- 2. Within 4 weeks of the date hereof, Ecos agrees to make a commercially reasonable good faith effort to cure any blighted conditions on the property. Within 3 months hereof, Ecos agrees to demolish the dilapidated garage subject only to the availability of a contractor to perform such work. Ecos agrees to use commercially reasonable good faith efforts to hire such contractor on a timely basis to meet the deadline.
- 3. Within fifteen (15) days of the satisfaction of the City's obligations under paragraph 4, Allco will make a one-time payment to the City in the amount of \$40,000.
  - 4. The City agrees to the following:
  - a. The City agrees that there has is no blight violation at either of the Properties, hereby withdraws all Blight violations, and agrees to promptly discharge the Lien placed on the Benz Street Property by the City;
  - b. The City agrees that the Facilities can tie into the City Stormwater system and that each of the Applications shall be promptly approved without further condition and in any event no later than October 1, 2023; provided that with respect to the Stormwater Application, the permit shall reflect that the City shall have the right to inspect the stormwater system in the immediate vicinity within 7 days of the date hereof and if the City determines that the stormwater system in the immediate vicinity needs repair, Ecos agrees that it will not tie into such system for a period of 2 months following such determination;
  - c. The City agrees to send a letter to DEEP indicating its approval of the Stormwater Application no later than November 15, 2023;
  - d. The City agrees to send a letter(s) to the Siting Council no later than November 15, 2023, supporting the Hill Street and Benz Street Facilities; which Solar Facilities may be in any configuration provided that such facilities are designed within the clearing limits depicted on **Exhibit A** hereto; and
  - e. The City agrees to issue of all City required permits to authorize the construction of two small roof-mounted solar facilities on the house and new garage on the Benz Street

property no later than two weeks after a complete application is submitted to the City, and contingent on such application meeting the City's existing standards and guidelines concerning such applications.

- 5. The City will support the development of the Solar Facilities. This means that the City will not participate in any proceeding at the state or local level, whether in the court system or any administrative proceeding, contested or otherwise, unless such participation is to support all aspects of the Solar Facilities, and confirm such support via letter to the Siting Council on or after November 15, 2023, as the Settling Parties shall reasonably request.
- 6. The City will have all necessary permits and other approvals and releases of easements issued in order to implement the purposes and requirements of this Agreement; including, but not limited to an easement (if necessary) to bury underground wires and conduit under the "old town road" that divides the Properties. If the "old town road" is owned by the State, the parties shall work in good faith to obtain the necessary easement.
- 7. From and after the date hereof, the Settling Parties shall at all times comply with any and all Construction Sequences approved by the Siting Council relative to the Hill Street and Benz Street Facilities.
- 8. Settling Parties agree to use a fixed-knot game fence as the perimeter fence for the Solar Facilities, to be installed by, and at the cost of, the Settling Parties.
- 9. Ecos agrees to enter the Facilities into Connecticut's contingent virtual net metering program with either Ansonia as the host customer or an agricultural host (who would allocate virtual net metering credits to Ansonia) on the same terms and conditions as the agreement with Westport attached hereto as **Exhibit B** provided that there is projected to be sufficient available virtual net metering credits for the Facilities. For the avoidance of doubt, Ecos makes no guarantees as to whether there will be capacity in the program or whether Ansonia will be accepted into it. Both parties agree to work in good faith to complete the application to the program on a timely basis. Ecos' agreement in this paragraph is contingent on the United Illuminating Company restoring the renewable energy credit contracts to full 15-year contracts from the estimated commercial operation date or some time after such commercial operation date.
- 10. Subject to the Facilities achieving commercial operation, Ecos will dedicate the land indicated on **Exhibit A** as land to be dedicated to the City as open space land in perpetuity.
- 11. Subject to the Facilities achieving commercial operation and receipt of the Low-Income Community bonus investment tax credit (the "Tax Credit") for both Facilities, Ecos will pay the Town \$180,000. For the avoidance of doubt, this payment will be apportioned if not all 3MW are built. For example, if only 2MW are built and achieve commercial operation, the Town shall receive \$120,000 upon the receipt of the Tax Credit. The City agrees to cooperate fully with the application process that is made to the Internal Revenue Service.

- 12. Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted as a waiver of the City to charge the Settling Parties with established permit and application fees other than with respect to the Stormwater Application.
- 13. With respect acts or conditions arising from and after the date hereof, nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted as preventing the City from enforcing its Building, Zoning and/or Blight Codes on the Hill Street and Benz Street Facilities, subject to the authority of the Connecting Siting Council.
- 14. The Settling Parties and the City agree to file within 15 days of full execution of this agreement, a motion or other stipulation that would terminate the claims against the City in the litigation in Federal District Court for the District of Connecticut entitled *PLH Vineyard Sky LLC et al.v. City of Ansonia et al.*, Case No. 3:23-cv-00833-KAD.
- 15. The Settling Parties, on the one hand, and the City, on the other hand, completely, unconditionally, finally and forever release and discharge the other, and their respective employees, attorneys, agents, officers and directors of and from any and all liability, rights, demands, claims, obligations, causes of action, actions, suits, controversies, debts due, sums of money, interest, attorney's fees, and damages of every kind, nature and description whatsoever, both known and unknown, which may exist as of the effective date of this Settlement Agreement related to the Properties.
- 16. Each of the Parties represent and warrant that they have the power to enter into, execute, deliver and carry out the terms of this Agreement and to perform their respective obligations under this Agreement and all such actions have been duly authorized by all necessary proceedings on their part.
  - 17. This Agreement is governed by Connecticut law.
- 18. Each Party agrees to do or cause to be done such further acts and things, and to deliver or cause to be delivered such additional agreements, consents, and instruments, as is reasonably required to carry into effect the purposes of this Agreement and the transactions contemplated hereby.
- 19. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original but all of which together will constitute one and the same instrument and shall be binding upon the person executing the same. This Agreement may be executed by a signature page delivered by telecopier or by a PDF file via email, in which case the party so executing this Agreement shall promptly thereafter deliver its originally executed signature page (but the failure to deliver an original shall not affect the binding nature of such Party's signature).
- 20. This Agreement may be amended only by a writing specifically referring to this Agreement that is dated after the date hereof and signed by or on behalf of each of the Parties

hereto. Any waiver of any party's rights is effective only if in writing signed by such Party and any such waiver shall be effective only for the specific matter waived and shall not be deemed to apply to any other conduct, provision or other matter. No amendment or waiver of any provision of this Agreement by oral communication or course of dealing shall be effective.

21. Any Party hereto may file this Agreement with any agency or court.

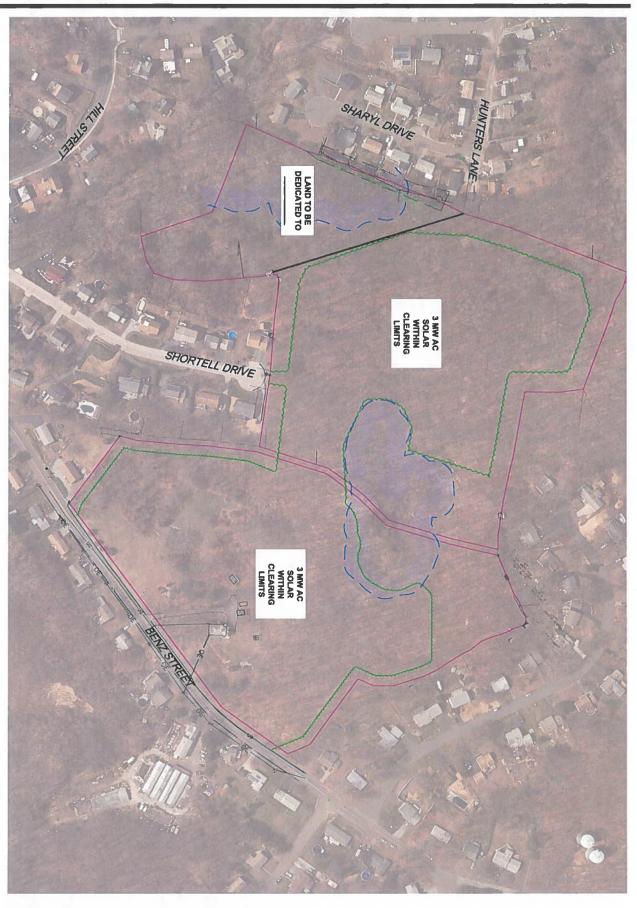

### **REVISED ORDINANCE**

Sec. 24-29. - Traffic protection.

The following applies to construction, excavation, power line installation/repair, telephone line installation/repair, cable installation/repair and/or any other activity in which a public roadway is being excavated or obstructed. It shall be the duty of every permittee, construction company or utility company under this article to make certain that the security of the travelling public is safeguarded and its rights are not unreasonably curtailed. If any excavation or obstruction shall be left upon any highway at night it shall be marked by flares, lanterns, lights, flashing beacons or other warning devices approved by the Public Works Director or Chief of Police. engineer. If the work performed on or under the highway-roadway shall make the travelled portion dangerous for the movement of vehicles, a watchmanor-a sufficient number of flagmen or a police officer(s) shall be assigned by the permittee, construction company or utility company to direct traffic. The Chief of Police shall designate specific streets/roadways wherein it will be mandatory that such police traffic protection be secured. For other Streets/Roadways that are not determined to need mandatory police traffic protection, the determination as to whether or not police protection is required at such site for the activities described herein shall be decided on a case-by-case basis by the Chief of Police or in his/her absence, a respective designee. The cost of all watchmen, flagmen or police officers shall be the responsibility of the permittee, construction company or utility company. In the event the work of the permittee, construction company or utility company requires the closing of a public highway for any period of time, notice shall be given in writing to the police department and the director of public works or his/her designated representative twenty-four hours in advance, unless emergency circumstances exist. Any street/roadway that is required to be closed shall require police traffic protection for the duration of the closure, regardless of whether the street had a mandatory police traffic protection designation or not. The Chief of Police or Public Works Delirector may determine the need for closing the highway and may require the work or work method be so altered as to provide for traffic flow if the closing of the street is not acceptable. The director or his agent shall provide written notice to the police and fire departmentsin advance of closing any public highway. Any permittee, construction company or utility company who leaves an excavation in an unsafe condition or abandons a street opening shall be liable for all costs incurred by the city to correct such conditions.

These regulations shall not apply to construction/excavation being completed by the Connecticut Department of Transportation or the Ansonia Public Works Department. Those agencies shall be allowed to use their own flagmen as an option to direct traffic.
